A boost for Denver Health amid funding challenges

On April 18, Gov. Jared Polis signed a number of budget bills into law, including a \$5 million state payment to Denver Health. We were hopeful that number was going to be higher to include money for uncompensated care for newcomers and renovations for Pavilion A, but those were not approved. We are grateful for the Colorado Legislature's support for Denver Health and will continue to advocate for more consistent funding to help with our financial sustainability needs. As a reminder, it costs Denver Health \$3.5 million a day to provide care for our patients. This funding is important as it helps to close the significant gap of uncompensated care, which is made up of the shortfall of payments for patients with Medicaid, Medicare, CICP or self-pay, which collectively added up to \$140 million last year. The Denver Sheriff Department (DSD) has issued a warning about a new telephone scam. The scammer pretends to be a DSD deputy and asks for payment in Bitcoin. They provide a fake badge number and threaten the victim by saying they have a warrant for their arrest for failure


